AAA: Area Agency on Aging

AARP: American Association of Retired

Persons

Abuse (personal): When another person does something on purpose that causes you mental or physical harm or pain.

Activities of Daily Living (ADLs): Everyday functions and activities that people usually do without help. These include dressing, eating, bathing, toileting, transferring, and continence. Many insurance policies use the inability to perform a certain number of ADLs to determine eligibility for benefits.

Acute Illness: A disease or condition that comes on rapidly and severely, but that can: with proper treatment: be cured, such as pneumonia or a broken bone.

Actuarial Equivalent: A plan sponsor must offer a prescription drug plan that is actuarially (a term relating to the statistical calculation of risk) the same or better than the Medicare Part D prescription drug plan.

ADC: Adult Day Care **ADHC:** Adult Day Health Care **ADL:** Activities of Daily Living

Administrative Law Judge (ALJ): A hearing officer who presides over appeals to Medicare by people with Medicare or their providers. The ALJ level follows the CHDR appeals level (for private plan appeals), the reconsideration level (for Part A appeals) and the fair hearing level (for Part B appeals).

Admitting Physician: The doctor responsible for admitting a patient to a hospital or other inpatient health facility.

ADNet: Adult Day Services Network

Adult with Severe and Persistent Mental Illness are persons 18 years of age and older who have a diagnosis of a major mental disorder (as defined by the American Psychiatric Association Diag-nostic and Statistical Manual IV or the most current edition) and meet any of the following criteria: documented evidence of long-term psychiatric disability; income due to psychiatric disability; income due to psychiatric disability (SSI, SSDI, Veterans or other); or inability to perform independently in day-to-day living if over

age of 59.

Adult Day Care: Community-based care designed to meet the needs of functionally and/or cognitively impaired adults who, for their own safety and well-being, can no longer be left at home alone during the day. Adult day care facilities such as senior or community centers offer protected settings which are normally open weekdays during business hours and include a mixture of health social and support services Specialized programs for individuals with Alzheimer's disease or related disorders also exist. Some facilities offer a wide range of therapeutic and rehabilitative activities as well as social activities, meals, and transportation.

Adult Family Care Home: Adult family care homes provide full-time, family-type living in a private home for up to five elderly persons or adults with a disability, who are not related to the owner. The owner lives in the same house as the residents. The basic services include, but are not limited to: housing and nutritional meals; help with the activities of daily living, like bathing, dressing, eating, walking, physical transfer, giving medications or helping residents give themselves medications; supervision of residents; arrange for health care services; provide or arrange for transportation to health care services; health monitoring; and social activities. Adult family care homes are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida.

Advance Beneficiary Notice (ABN): A notice health care providers and suppliers are required to give a person with Original Medicare when they believe that Medicare will not cover their services or items and the person has no reason to know that Medicare will not cover the items or services. If your provider does not give you an ABN to sign and you have no reason to know the procedure is not covered, then you do not have to pay. If you sign an ABN before you get the service or item, and Medicare does not pay for it, you generally pay for it, although there are a few exceptions. Providers are not required to give

you an ABN for services or items Medicare never covers.

Advance Coverage Decision: A Private Fee-For-Service plan's determination about whether or not it will pay for a certain service. Note: this is completely unrelated to an advance beneficiary notice (ABN), which only applies to people with Original Medicare.

Advance Directive: A legal document that outlines how you want medical decisions made if you lose the ability to make decisions for yourself. A health care advance directive may include a living will and a power of attorney for health care decisions.

Advanced Illness: A serious disease or condition that has progressed too far to be cured, such as cancer that has spread throughout the body.

AFCH: Adult Family Care Home

Affordable Care Act (ACA): The Affordable Care Act actually refers to two separate pieces of legislation — the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (P.L. 111-148) and the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 (P.L. 111-152) —that, together expand Medicaid coverage to millions of low-income Americans

Aged and Disabled Adult Medicaid Waiver: Federally funded program that provides in-home services to eligible elders.

Agency for Health Care Administration (AHCA): As the state's designated agency for regulating and licensing health care and skilled nursing facilities, AHCA is responsible for the state Medicaid program. Call AHCA at 1-888-419-3456 if you have questions about Medicaid. They also accept complaints on hospitals, nursing homes, assisted living facilities, home health agencies, adult day care facilities, or other specialized health care providers.

Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC): An Aging Resource Center that, under the terms of a grant from the Administration on Aging and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, also provides single point of entry to long-term care services, either directly or through agree-

ments with providers, for adults with severe and persistent mental illness.

Aging Resource Center (ARC): An administrative entity designated by the Department of Elder Affairs (DOEA) accessible through multiple entry points that provides access to economic and long-term care services for all elders and their families, regardless of ability to pay. The eligibility functions are determined by the Comprehensive Assessment and Review for Long-term Care Services (CARES)/DOEA and the Department of Children and Families (DCF) Economic-Self Sufficiency programs integrated through collocation of DOEA and DCF staff, either physically or virtually. (§58B-1.001(1) F.A.C.)

Aging Resource Center (ARC): As defined by Chapter 58A-7.001 (1).

AHCA: Agency for Health Care Administration

ALF: Assisted Living Facility **ALW:** Assisted Living Waiver

Alzheimer's Disease: A progressive, degenerative form of dementia that affects brain functions, causing loss of short-term memory, the ability to reason, the ability to care for oneself and deterioration of language skills. While Alzheimer's is currently not curable, several new medications can slow the rate of degeneration for many people.

Alzheimer's Disease Initiative (ADI): Publicly funded program to address the needs of those persons diagnosed with dementia.

Ambulatory Care: All types of health services that do not require an overnight hospital stay.

Ambulatory Surgical Center: Ambulatory surgical centers (ASCs) are freestanding facilities that are not part of a hospital. An ASC provides elective surgical care where the patient is admitted to and discharged from the facility within the same working day. The patient does not stay overnight. Hospitals can have outpatient surgical units, but these units would be a part of the hospital license and would not require a separate ASC license. Ambula-tory surgical centers are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida.

Ambulette: A wheelchair-accessible van that provides non-emergency transportation for people with disabilities.

ANDI: Aging Network Development Institute **ANE:** Abuse. Neglect. and Exploitation

Annual Coordinated Election Period (ACEP): The period of time between November 15 and December 31 of every year when you can change your Medicare private drug plan and/or your Medicare health plan choice for the following year. This is also the time you can enroll in the Medicare prescription drug benefit (Part D) if you do not enroll during your Initial Enrollment Period (you may have to pay a premium penalty if you enroll during this time unless you had drug coverage from another source that was at least as good as Medicare's and you were not without that coverage for more than 63 days). Your new coverage will begin January 1.

A0A: Administration on Aging

Appeal: A special kind of complaint that you make to your private Medicare plan or Original Medicare when you disagree with a decision it has made about your health care. For example, you might appeal if your health plan doesn't pay for care you need.

Applicant: Person who is requesting assistance.

Approved Amount: The fee that Medicare sets as its rate for a medical service. Medicare will cover 80 percent of this amount (or 50 percent for mental health services) and you (or your supplemental insurance) are responsible for the remainder. All doctors and other providers who take assignment must accept this approved amount as full payment, even if they normally charge more for the service

APS: Adult Protective Services

Area Agency on Aging (AAA): A nation-wide network of State and local programs that help older people plan and care for their life-long needs. Services include information and referral for in-home services, counseling, legal services, adult day care, skilled nursing care/therapy, transportation, personal care, respite care, nutrition and meals. For Brevard,

Orange, Osceola, and Seminole Counties, this is the Senior Resource Alliance also named Area Agency on Aging of Central Florida.

Assets: Resources such as savings and checking accounts, stocks, bonds, mutual funds, retirement accounts, and real estate.

Assignment: A Medicare term used to describe an agreement by a doctor to accept Medicare's approved amount as payment in full. Any doctor who is a "participating provider" in the Medicare program always takes assignment. Participating providers may not charge you more than Medicare's approved amount. If you have Original Medicare, it can save you money to see a doctor who takes assignment.

Assisted Living Facility (ALF): Assisted living facilities (ALF) provide full-time living arrangements in the least restrictive and most home-like setting. The basic services include, but are not limited to: housing and nutritional meals; help with the activities of daily living, like bathing, dressing, eating, walking, physical transfer, giving medications or helping residents give themselves medications; arrange for health care services; provide or arrange for transportation to health care services; health monitoring; respite care; and social activities. Assisted living facilities are licensed and surveved by the State of Florida.

Assisted Living for the Frail Elderly Medicaid Waiver (ALE): Federally funded program that provides services to qualified individuals residing in participating assisted living facilities.

Assistive Technology: Any item, piece of equipment or system that is used to increase, maintain or improve the functional capabilities of individuals with disabilities. For example, Closed Circuit Television is an assistive technology, which Medicare will cover if medically necessary. Simple items like "grabbers" and "reachers" are not covered by Medicare. Authorization: MCO approval necessary prior to the receipt of care. (Generally, this is different from a referral in that, an authorization can be a verbal or written approval from the MCO whereas a referral is generally a

written document that must be received by a doctor before giving care to the beneficiary.)

Balance Bill: When doctors and hospitals charge you for the balance on a bill after your health plan or Original Medicare has paid its approved amount.

Beneficiary: A person over 65 or under 65 with Social Security Disability Insur-ance who receives health insurance through the Medicare program.

Benefit Period: The amount of time during which Medicare pays for hospital and skilled nursing facility (SNF) services. A benefit period begins the first day you enter the hospital or SNF and ends when you no longer receive hospital or skilled care in a SNF for 60 days in a row. With each new benefit period, you pay a new deductible. Your coinsurance is determined by the number of days you have been in the facility during each benefit period.

Bereavement Services: A hospice service that provides counseling for the family up to a year after the patient passes away.

Biologicals: Usually a drug or vaccine made from a live product and used medically to diagnose, prevent, or treat a medical condition. For example, a pneumonia or flu shot.

BOCA: Brevard County Commission on Aging **C**

Capped Rental Item: Durable medical equipment (such as a wheelchair) that Medicare covers initially for rental, rather than for purchase, often because of its high cost. Medicare pays the rental fees for these items in monthly installments. You can keep a capped rental item as long as it is medically necessary and elect to buy it after renting it for ten months. If you continue to rent it, you are not responsible for the cost of its repairs or replacement parts.

Care Manager: A health care professional, typically a nurse or social worker, who arranges, monitors, or coordinates long-term care services (also referred to as a care coordinator or case manager). A care manager may also assess a patient's needs and develop a plan of care, subject to approval by the

patient's physician.

Caregiver: An adult (typically a family member or friend) who provides unpaid assistance to another adult who can no longer independently attend to his or her personal needs and/or perform his or her normal activities of daily living.

CARES: Comprehensive Assessment and Review for Long-term Care Services unit of the Department of Elder Affairs. This unit is responsible for determining functional eligibility for a number of public programs.

CARES Referral: A form that is used to notify CARES that a potential client is interested in assessment for program participation.

Carrier: A private company that has a contract with Medicare to process Part B claims. (*See also Medicare Carrier.*)

Case Management: Coordination of client information and linking to resources to meet their needs.

Catastrophic Coverage: Insurance designed to protect you from having to pay very high out-of-pocket costs. Catastrophic coverage usually begins after you have spent a pre-determined amount. Medicare Parts A and B do not offer catastrophic coverage. They always pay the same amount regardless of how much you have spent. The new Medicare prescription drug benefit (Part D) does offer catastrophic coverage. After you have spent a certain amount out-of-pocket (\$3.600 in 2006), you will only pay five percent of the cost of each prescription (in addition to vour monthly plan premium).

Catastrophic Limit: The highest amount of money you have to pay out-of-pocket during a given period of time for certain services. After you have reached the catastrophic limit, a higher level of coverage begins.

CCDA: Community Care for the Disabled

CCRC: Continuing Care Retirement Community

Center for Health Dispute Resolution (**CHDR**): An independent agency that contracts with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to review Medicare private plan appeals.

Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS): Formerly known as the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), CMS is the United States government agency responsible for administering Medicare and Medicaid. It is made up of three agencies: the Center for Beneficiary Choices, the Center for Medicare Management, and the Center for Medicaid and State Operations.

Central Receiving: A single point of entry into the mental health and substance abuse system for assessments and appropriate placement for individuals experiencing a crisis in Orange County. This resource is designated for use by law enforcement only.

Certificate of Credible Coverage: A written certificate issued by a group health plan or health insurance issuer (including an HMO) that states the period of time you were covered by your health plan.

Certificate of Medical Necessity (CMN):Documentation from a doctor which Medicare requires before it will cover certain durable medical equipment. The CMN states the patient's diagnosis, prognosis, reason for the equipment, and estimated duration of need.

Certified: A long-term care facility, home health agency, or hospice agency that meets the requirements imposed by Medicare and Medicaid is said to be certified. Being certified is not the same as being accredited. Medicare, Medicaid and some long-term care insurance policies only cover care in a certified facility or provided by a certified agency. Certified Aging-in-Place Specialist (CAPS): a National Association of Home Ruilders (NAHR) designation earned by indi-

(CAPS): a National Association of Home Builders (NAHB) designation earned by individuals trained in the unique needs of the older adult population, aging in place home modifications, common remodeling projects, and solutions to common barriers.

Certified Graduate Remodeler (CGR): a National Association of Home Builders (NAHB) exclusive professional designation earned by qualified individuals that emphasizes business management skills as the key to a professional remodeling operation.

Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA): CNAs

are trained and certified to help nurses by providing non-medical assistance to patients, such as help with eating, cleaning and dressing.

CF: Department of Children and Families

CHIC: Community Health Improvement Council

Choice Counseling: Terminology used to describe the federally funded Long-term Care Diversion Programs activity by CARES to provide information about all available community resources that will assist the client in making an informed decisions.

Chronic Illness or Condition: An illness or other condition with one or more of the following characteristics: permanency, residual disability, requires rehabilitation training, or requires a long period of supervision, observation, or care. Typically, it is a disease or condition that lasts over a long period of time and cannot be cured; it is often associated with disability.

CIRTS: Client Information Registration and Tracking System

CIS: Client Information System

Civilian Health and Medical Program (CHAMPUS): Run by the Department of Defense, in the past CHAMPUS gave medical care to active duty members of the military, military retirees, and their eligible dependents. (This program is now called "TRICARE") Claim: A bill that asks for payment for services or benefits you received. Medicare Part A claims are processed by Fiscal Intermediaries and Part B claims are processed by Medicare Carriers

CMS: Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (formally HCFA)

CMS: CARES Management System

CMS Hearing Officer: An individual designated by CMS to conduct the appeals process for a claim dispute.

CNA: Certified Nursing Assistant

Cognitive Impairment: Deterioration of intellectual ability, such as disorientation as to people, places or time; impairment of short-term or long-term memory; and/or impairment of one's ability to reason; that has

progressed to the extent that a person requires substantial supervision by another person. Cognitive impairment includes Alzheimer's disease and senile dementia. The existence of cognitive impairment is determined by clinical evidence and standardized tests that reliably measure the person's impairment. For more information, click on Senile Dementia symptoms.

Coinsurance: The portion of the cost of care you are required to pay after your health plan pays. Usually, it is a percentage of an approved amount. In Original Medicare the coinsurance is usually 20% of the Medicareapproved amount.

Community Care for the Elderly (CCE): Publicly funded program that provides services on a sliding fee scale basis to qualified elders

Community Case Manager: Depart-ment of Children and Families Mental Health Contracted case coordination for the targeted populations of mental health and substance abuse clients

Companionship Services: Companions visit isolated and homebound elders for conversation, reading, and light errands. May also be termed "friendly visitor" services.

Comprehensive Outpatient Rehabilitation Facility (CORF): A comprehensive outpatient rehabilitation facility is a non-residential facility that provides diagnostic, therapeutic, and restorative services for the rehabilitation of injured, disabled, or sick persons, by or under the supervision of a physician. Comprehensive outpatient rehabilitation facilities are not required to be licensed by the state if they are Medicare certified. Comprehensive outpatient rehabilitation facilities that are not certified under the Medicare program may require licensure as a health care clinic.

Congregate Meal Programs: Nutritional programs that provide lunches for older adults Monday through Friday in senior centers, community centers and schools.

Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA): A law that

lets some people keep their employer group health plan coverage for a period of time after: the death of your spouse, losing your job, having your working hours reduced, leaving your job voluntarily, or getting a divorce. You may have to pay both your share and the employer's share of the premium. Generally, you also have to pay an administrative fee.

Continuing Care Retirement Community (CCRC): A retirement community that offers a broad range of services and levels of care based on what each resident needs over time. Sometimes called "life care," it can range from independent living in an apartment to assisted living to full-time care in a nursing home. Residents move from one setting to another based on their needs. Care in CCRCs can be expensive, with a large payment often required before moving in, and monthly fees thereafter.

Continuous Open Enrollment: A consumer's right to buy private insurance any time, regardless of age or health status.

Conversion Policy: An employer-sponsored group policy that can be converted to an individual policy with the same insurance company. These policies are usually very expensive. Coordination of Benefits: The sharing of costs by two or more health plans, based on their respective financial responsibilities for medical claims. Your primary insurance and secondary insurance must coordinate benefits

Copayment: A set amount you are required to pay for each medical service you receive, such as a visit you make to a health care provider. It usually ranges from \$10 to \$25.

in order to pay claims.

Coordination Period: For people with endstage renal disease, the period of time during which an employer group health plan pays first and Medicare pays second. Medicare may pay the remaining costs if your group health plan doesn't pay 100 percent of your health care bills during the coordination peri-

Cost Sharing: The portion of medical care that you pay yourself, such as a copayment, coinsurance or deductible.

Cost Tiers: A system that drug plans use to price medications. Generic drugs are generally on the first, and least expensive tier, followed by brand-name drugs, and then specialty drugs, with each subsequent tier requiring higher out-of-pocket costs.

COW: Community Outreach and Wellness Program

CPSS: Community Partnership for Senior Services

Creditable Coverage: Is health coverage that you had in the past that gives you certain rights when you apply for new coverage.

Creditable Coverage (MEDIGAP): Certain kinds of previous health insurance coverage that can be used to shorten a pre-existing condition waiting period under a Medigap policy. (See pre-existing conditions.)

Creditable Prescription Drug Coverage: Prescription drug coverage (like from an employer or union), that pays out, on average, as much as or more than Medicare's standard prescription drug coverage.

CRITICAL ACCESS HOSPITAL: A small facility that gives limited outpatient and inpatient hospital services to people in rural areas.

Crisis Hotline: Emergency counseling provided by trained professionals for individuals whose safety is in ieopardy.

Crisis Stabilization Unit/Receiving Facility: As defined by Chapter 394, F.S., means any public or private facility designated by the department to receive and hold involuntary patients under emergency conditions or for psychiatric evaluation or to provide short term treatment. The term does not include a county iail.

CSC: Community Service Center.

CSN/2-1-1: Community Service Network/Elder Helpline

CSS: Community Services System

Curative Care: The treatment of patients with the intent of curing their disease or condition; for example, chemotherapy treatments to cure breast cancer.

Currently Working: You are considered to be "currently working" as long as **you have**

employment rights at your company, even if you do not work on a regular basis, are on sick leave, are a seasonal worker, or have been temporarily laid-off. You are **not** considered to be "currently working" if you receive Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI), have received disability benefits from your employer for **more than** six months, or if you receive your employer insurance through COBRA.

Custodial Care: Non-medical care, such as cooking, cleaning, and shopping. Medicare generally does not cover custodial care.

D

Deductible: The amount you must pay for health care or prescriptions, before Original Medicare, your prescription drug plan, or other insurance begins to pay. For example, in Original Medicare, you pay a new deductible for each benefit period for Part A, and each year for Part B. These amounts can change every year.

Dementia: Deterioration of intellectual abilities (e.g., vocabulary, abstract thinking, judgment, memory loss, physical coordination), the loss of which interferes with daily activities. Dementia can be caused by degenerative diseases (e.g., Alzheimer's, Huntington's and Parkinson's diseases), vascular diseases or stroke, metabolic disorders (thyroid, liver kidney dysfunction and certain vitamin deficiencies), aids, drugs and alcohol, and psychiatric disorders. Some dementias may respond to treatments, others do not. For more information, click on Senile Dementia symptoms.

Denial of Coverage: A refusal by Medicare or a private plan to pay for medical services that are not covered under its policy.

Department of Children and Families (**DCF**): While serving as the principal advocacy and protection agency for Florida's children, DCF also administers the state's financial assistance programs. Programs that provide assistance to elders include determining the eligibility of food stamps, OSS (Optional State Supplementation) and Medicaid applicants. The Department of Children and Families also administers the Adult Protective

Services program. This program provides state-mandated investigation of all allegations of abuse, neglect or exploitation.

Department of Children and Families Economic Self Sufficiency (DCF/ESS):The State Agency unit that determines financial eligibility for publicly funded programs.

Department of Children and Families Mental Health and Substance Abuse (DCF/MHSA): The State agency that contracts with community mental and health substance abuse agencies to provide funding.

Department of Health (DOH): The Florida Department of Health has oversight responsibility for the state's public health system, which includes immunizations and disease control. DOH also licenses and regulates doctors, nurses, pharmacists, dentists and other medical professionals.

Department of Veteran's Affairs (DVA): The Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs has no jurisdiction over the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. However, this department's service officers are able, in some cases, to assist Floridians in their attempts to procure their benefits or to assist in gaining access to them. The DVA is responsible for administering the Capital Asset Realignment for Enhanced Services, which realigns medical facilities and services to meet veteran's needs and provide high quality care.

Department of Veterans Affairs (VA): A government agency that provides federal benefits to veterans and their families. These benefits include pensions, educational stipends and health care services, among others. (*See also VA Benefits.*)

Detoxification (Detox): A medically managed detoxification and addictions receiving facility that does both voluntary and involuntary detoxification assessments and stabilization.

Diagnosis: The name for the health problem that you have.

Disenrollment: Leaving a health plan like an HMO.

DOEA: The (Florida) Department of Elder Affairs administers a wide variety of assis-

tance programs sponsored by both the federal government and the state of Florida. Major program initiatives sponsored by the department include in-home and community-based services, information advocacy and caregiver support, Communities for a Lifetime, volunteer training, health and wellness promotion, and elder abuse and prevention. In addition, the department, through its "CARES" units, provides assessment services and counseling about alternatives for those considering a nursing home.

DOEA Screening and Eligibility Tool: Statewide intake, prioritization and eligibility form, yet to be developed.

Doughnut Hole: Also called a "Coverage Gap." A gap in insurance coverage during which you must pay all drug costs in full; often followed by "catastrophic coverage" from the insurance plan.

DPOA: Adult Services District Office

DriveABLE: Driving Assessment System utilized by Senior Resource Alliance

DriveWell: National Speakers Bureau on Older Driver Issues

Drug Class: A group of drugs that treat the same symptoms or have similar effects on the body. For example, people with Medicare often use statin class drugs, which are used for reducing cholesterol. Drugs in this class include (but are not limited to) Lipitor, Zocor, Pravachol, Zetia, and Vytorin.

Drug List: A list of drugs covered by a plan. This list is also called a formulary.

Dual Eligible: A person who has both Medicare and Medicaid.

Durable Medical Equipment (DME): Equipment that is primarily serving a medical purpose, is able to withstand repeated use, and is appropriate for use in the home; for example, wheelchairs, oxygen equipment and hospital beds. To be covered by Medicare, durable medical equipment must be prescribed by a doctor. Many types of adaptive equipment are not covered.

Durable Medical Equipment Regional Carrier (DMERC): A private company that contracts with Medicare to pay bills for

durable medical equipment.

Durable Power of Attorney: See power of attorney.

Durable Power of Attorney for Health are: See power of attorney for health care.

Ε

Earned Income: Money you get because you work, such as wages from work and earnings from self-employment.

Eating: The fourth activity of daily living. Feeding oneself by getting food into the body from a receptacle (such as a plate, cup or table). It does not include preparation of meals.

ECC: Extended Congregate Care

EEOC: Equal Employment Opportunity Commission

EHEAP: Emergency Home Energy Assistance for the Elderly

Eldercare: A wide range of services provided at home, in the community, and in residential care facilities, including assisted living facilities and nursing homes. It includes health-related services such as rehabilitative therapies, skilled nursing, and palliative care, as well as supervision and a wide range of supportive personal care and social services. Typically, eldercare is provided over an extended period of time to people who need another person's assistance to perform normal activities of daily living because of cognitive impairment or loss of muscular strength or control. Regardless of where it is provided, most elder care is custodial care, the type of care that is not paid for by Medicare. Public, private, formal, and informal programs and support systems, government laws, and finding ways to meet the needs of the elderly, including: housing, home care, pensions, Social Security, long-term care, health insurance, and elder law.

Election Periods: The times when a Medicare-eligible person can choose to join or leave Original Medicare or a Medicare Advantage plan. There are four types of election periods: the annual election period, the initial election period, the special election period, and the open enrollment period.

EMS: Enrollment Management System

(CARES)

Enrollment: Joining Original Medicare or becoming a member of a private health plan, like a Medicare HMO.

ESN: Elder Services Network

Explanation of Medicare Benefits (**EOMB**): The notice you get from Medicare after receiving medical services from a doctor, hospital or other health care provider. It tells you what the provider billed Medicare, Medicare's approved amount, the amount Medicare paid, and what you have to pay. It is **not** a bill. (*See also Medicare Summary Notice (MSN)*.)

End-Stage Renal Disease (ESRD): This is a program that offers dialysis services. (Dialysis cleans the blood by passing it through a special machine. This is necessary when the kidneys are not able to filter the blood.) The program can either be a freestanding facility or offered as an outpatient service through a hospital. End-stage renal disease programs are not required to have a state license.

Excess Charge: If you are in Original Medicare, this is the difference between a doctor's or other health care provider's actual charge (which may be limited by Medicare or the state) and the Medicare-approved payment amount

Extra Help: A Federal program that is administered by Social Security that helps people with Medicare who have low incomes and assets pay for their Medicare drug coverage (including coinsurance, deductibles, and premiums). If you have Medicaid, receive Supple-mental Security Income (SSI), or are enrolled in a Medicare Savings Program (MSP), then you are automatically eligible for Extra Help.

Expedited Appeal: A fast decision from the Medicare Advantage plan about whether it will provide a health service. A beneficiary may receive a fast decision within 72 hours when life, health or ability to regain function may be jeopardized.

Federal Poverty Level (FPL): The federally set level of income that an individual or family can earn below which it is recognized that they can not afford necessary services. The FPL is used in eligibility criteria of many programs, including Extra Help and Medicaid. The FPL changes every year and varies depending on the number of people in your household. It is higher in Alaska and Hawaii.

Federally Qualified Health Center (**FQHC**): Health centers located in "medically underserved areas" that provide low-cost health care. Medicare will pay for some health services in FQHCs that it generally does not cover, such as a routine check-up. FQHCs include community health centers, migrant health services, and health centers for the homeless.

Fee-for-Service: Payment to providers for each service they provide, as in Original Medicare

FFS: Fee for Service

FHCA: Florida Health Care Association

Financial Eligibility Determination: Process by which Department of Children and Families Economic Self Sufficiency unit gathers data on income and assets of a person to determine if the person will be eligible for publicly funded programs.

Fiscal Intermediary: A private company that has a contract with Medicare to process Medicare Part A claims (bills from hospitals and skilled nursing facilities). (*See also Intermediary*.)

FLAG: Florida Local Action Group

Form 2515: Department of Children and Families form that is used to communicate

status of a client to that agency.

Formulary: The list of prescription drugs that your private health plan, like a Medicare HMO, will pay for either in part or in full. Drugs not on the formulary are generally not covered by private health plans.

FPECA: Florida Policy Exchange Center of Aging

Free Look: A period of time when you can try out a Medicare supplemental insurance (Medigap) policy. During this time (usually 30 days), you can cancel the policy and get a full refund.

FSSRC: Florida Senior Safety Resource Centers

G

Gaps in Coverage: Services or costs that are not covered under the Original Medicare plan, such as prescription drugs, deductibles, and coinsurance.

Gatekeeper: In a managed care plan, like an HMO, your primary care doctor (PCP) oversees your care and decides when to refer you to specialty care.

General Enrollment Period: The time period between January 1 and March 31 of every year when you can enroll in Medicare Part B. If you enroll during this period, your coverage will begin on July 1.

Generic Drug: A prescription drug that has the same active-ingredient formula as a brand name drug. Generic drugs usually cost less than brand name drugs and are rated by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to be as safe and effective as brand name drugs.

Geriatrician: A physician who specializes in the care of the elderly, primarily those who are frail and have complex medical and social problems.

GR: General Revenue

Grievance: A complaint filed with your Medicare health plan about the care you are receiving. For example, you may file a grievance if you are dissatisfied with the condition of a health care facility or if you have a complaint about staff behavior or the facility's operating hours. An appeal, not a grievance, is the appropriate way to complain about a

denial of care or coverage.

GRTS: Geriatric Residential Treatment Systems

Guaranteed Issue: A consumer protection that gives people the right to buy Medicare supplemental insurance (Medigap). Because of this right, which is in effect during certain times, an insurance company cannot deny you insurance coverage or place conditions on a policy, must cover your pre-existing conditions, and cannot charge you more for a policy because of your health status. (See also Medigap.)

Guaranteed Issue Rights (also called CALLED "MEDIGAP PROTECTIONS"):

Rights you have in certain situations when insurance companies are required by law to sell or offer you a Medigap policy. In these situations, an insurance company can't deny you a policy, or place conditions on a policy, such as exclusions for pre-existing conditions, and can't charge you more for a policy because of past or present health problems.

Guaranteed Renewable: A right you have that requires your insurance company to automatically renew or continue your Medigap policy, unless you make untrue statements to the insurance company, commit fraud or don't pay your premiums.

Guardian: A person who is appointed by a court and charged with the legal duty to care for another person who is unable to care for himself or herself

Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA): See Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).

HCBS: Home and Community-Based Services

HCE: Home Care for the Elderly

HCFA: Health Care Finance Administra-tion: **NOW CMS**: Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services

HCI: Healthy Community Initiative

Health Care Clinics: A health care clinic provides health care services to individuals for a fee. Health care clinics are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida. These include: Mobile Clinic, a self contained treat-

ment or diagnostic unit that travels to set locations where the patients enter the unit for treatment:

MRI, a clinic that performs diagnostic services like magnetic resonance imaging (MRI); Portable Equipment Provider, business in which the provider performs services in multiple locations like doctor's offices, or private residences.

Health Care Clinics – Exemptions: These are businesses that have gotten an exemption to the health care clinic license requirement. However, businesses that meet the exemption criteria are not required to have an official exemption, so there may be clinics that are exempt that are not listed here. The exemption criteria are listed in section 400.9905(3), Florida Statutes.

Health Care Provider: An individual or facility, such as a doctor or hospital, which provides health care services. (See also Provider.) Health Care Services Pool: A health care services pool provides temporary employment of licensed, certified, or trained health care personnel to health care facilities, residential facilities, and agencies. Health care services pools are registered by the State of Florida.

HHS: U. S. Department of Health and Human Services

Hill-Burton Program/Facilities: Hospi-tals and clinics that offer free or reduced-cost care to patients who meet qualifying income limits. These vary in what types of services they offer and do not provide services that are covered by a patient's insurance.

Health Insurance Portability And Accountability Act (HIPAA) Of 1996: A Federal law that allows persons to qualify immediately for comparable health insurance coverage when they change their employment relationships. Title II, Subtitle F, of HIPAA gives HHS the authority to mandate the use of standards for the electronic exchange of health care data; to specify what medical and administrative code sets should be used within those standards; to require the use of national identification systems for health care patients, providers, payers (or plans), and

employers (or sponsors); and to specify the types of measures required to protect the security and privacy of personally identifiable health care information. Also known as the Kennedy-Kassebaum Bill, the Kassebaum-Kennedy Bill, K2, or Public Law 104-191.

HMO (Health Maintenance Organization): A type of managed care plan that generally covers only the care you get from doctors, hospitals, and other health care providers that are in the HMO network. The government pays HMOs a set amount to provide health care to people with Medicare. HMO members must choose a primary care doctor who coordinates their care and decides when they can go to a specialist.

Homes for Special Services: A home for special services is a residential facility where specialized health care services are provided, including personal and custodial care, but not full-time nursing services. Home for special services are licensed by the State of Florida. **Home Health Agency:** A home health agency provides services to patients in private homes, assisted living facilities, and adult family care homes. Some of the services include nursing care; physical, occupational, respiratory, and speech therapy; home health aides; homemaker and companions: and medical equipment and supplies. Along with services in the home, an agency can also provide staffing services in nursing homes and hospitals. Home health agencies are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida. If it lists Medicare and/or Medicaid under Certification Status on Facility Locator that means the agency can serve Medicare and/or Medicaid patients.

Homebound: A person whose condition is such that there exists a normal inability to leave home, and leaving home requires "a considerable and taxing effort. A person does not have to be confined to the bed to be considered *homebound* by Medicare. Leaving home for short periods of time for special nonmedical events, such as a family reunion, funeral, or graduation, would not exclude someone from being considered homebound.

A doctor must certify this condition.

Home Health Aide: A worker who helps a patient at home with activities of daily living, such as getting in and out of bed, dressing, bathing, eating and using the bathroom. Medicare does not pay separately for aides to perform house-keeping services, such as cooking and cleaning, but they may do light housekeeping related to personal care during the visit. Medicare will not pay for home health aide services unless they are accompanied by a skilled need.

Home Health Care: Care provided at home to treat an illness or injury. Medicare will only cover care in the home if the person has a skilled care need. (*See also Skilled Care*.)

Homemaker and Companion Services: These companies provide housekeeping, prepare and serve meals, help with shopping, routine household chores, companionship in the client's home, and can take the client to appointments and other outings. By law, homemakers and companions may not provide hands-on personal care, such as help with bathing, and cannot give medications. Homemaker and companion agencies are registered by the State of Florida. However, individuals who work on their own, with no other workers helping them are not required to be registered.

Homemaker Services: Household services done by someone other than yourself because you are unable to do them. These services can include shopping, laundry, light cleaning, meal preparation and transportation assistance. Home-makers cannot provide hands-on care in most states.

Home Medical Equipment and Services: A home medical equipment company sells or rents medical equipment and services for use in the home. Home medical equipment includes any product as defined by the Federal Drug Administration's Drugs, Devices and Cosmetics Act; any products reimbursed under the Medicare Part B Durable Medical Equipment benefits; or any products reimbursed under the Florida Medicaid durable medical equipment program. Home medical

equipment includes oxygen and related respiratory equipment; manual, motorized, or customized wheelchairs and related seating and positioning. Service includes managing the equipment and teaching consumers in its use. Home medical equipment companies are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida. **Hospice:** A hospice provides services in a patient's residence or in a hospice facility for patients with a diagnosis of a terminal illness. They provide a coordinated program of professional services, including pain management and counseling for patients; nursing, physician, therapy, and social work services; counseling and support for family members and friends of the patient; and other support services. Hospices are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida.

Hospital: A hospital provides a range of health care services for people who need care longer than 24 hours, including medical, surgical, psychiatric, testing, and diagnostic services; and treatment for illness, injury, disease, pregnancy, etc. Also available are laboratory and X-ray services, and treatment facilities for surgery or obstetrical care, or special services like burn treatment centers. Hospitals are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida. Hospitals are subject to annual Life-Safety surveys by the State of Florida. Non-accredited hospitals are also subject to annual licensure inspections.

Hospital-Issued Notice of Non-Coverage (HINN): A written notice that explains why a patient is not being admitted to or is being discharged from a hospital. It also explains a person's rights to appeal that decision.

Housekeeping Services: See Custodial Care.

HUD: Department of Housing and Urban Development

H&W: Health and Wellness

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Incontinence: The inability to control urination, bowel movements or both. Also see continence.

Information: Access to services as defined in the January 2000 *Home and Community*

Based Services Manual.

Initial Coverage Election Period: The three months immediately before you are entitled to Medicare Part A and enrolled in Part B. If you choose to join a Medicare health plan during this period, the plan must accept you, unless it has reached its member limit.

Initial Enrollment Period: The first chance you have to enroll in Part A, Part B or Part D if you don't get it automatically. If you enroll during this time, which begins three months before you first meet the eligibility requirements for Medicare and continues for seven months, you do not pay a premium penalty.

Inpatient Care: Care that you get when you are in the hospital overnight.

Intake: Process of gathering initial client data

Intermediary: A private company that has a contract with Medicare to process Part A claims. (*See entry for Fiscal Intermediary.*)

I&R: Information and Referral

I&R Database: Resource database for community services

IRIS: Information & Referral Information System

ITN: Independent Transportation Network

JEP: Jobs Training Partnership **JTPA:** Job Training Partnership Act

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KPMG: Accounting and Management Consulting Firm

LAN: Local Area Network

Lead Agency: Community-based agency, contracted through the Area Agency on Aging to provide case management and other program services.

Level of Care: The determination rendered by CARES that a client meets the functional criteria for long-term care services.

Lifetime Reserve Days: Also known as "reserve days." When you are in the hospital for more than 90 days, Medicare pays for 60 additional reserve days that you can only use once in your lifetime. They are not renewable once you use them.

Limiting Charge: An upper limit on how much doctors who do not accept Medicare's approved amount as payment in full can charge to people with Medicare. Federal law sets the limit at 15 percent more than the Medicare-approved amount. Some states limit it even further. For example, in New York it is five percent more. This charge is in addition to 20 percent coinsurance (50 percent for mental health services). Providers who "opt out" of Medicare are not subject to these limiting charges and can charge as much as they want, if the patient signs an agreement with them prior to receiving care.

Living Trust: A trust created during someone's lifetime to hold assets during that person's lifetime, thereby removing those assets from probate at death. A living trust can be either revocable or irrevocable. It avoids probate and therefore gets assets distributed significantly faster than a will. Assets that a person wants to move to a living trust, such as real estate and bank or brokerage accounts, must be retitled.

Living Will: A legal document in which a person specifies which life-prolonging medical measures he or she does, and does not, want to be taken if he or she becomes terminally ill or incapacitated.

Long-term Care: A variety of services provided over an extended period of time to people who need help to perform normal activities of daily living because of cognitive impairment or loss of muscular strength or control. Care may include rehabilitative therapies, skilled nursing, and palliative care, as well as supervision and a wide range of supportive personal care and social services. It may also include training to help older people adjust to or overcome many of the limitations that often come with aging. Long-term care can be provided at home, in the community, or in various types of facilities, including nursing homes and assisted living facilities. Regardless of where it is provided, most longterm care is custodial care, the type of care that is not paid for by Medicare.

Long-term Care Diversion Program:

Federally funded program that provides inhome, ALF, or NH services to eligible elders using a managed care model.

Long-term Care Ombudsman: An independent advocate for nursing home and assisted living facility residents who provides information about how to find a facility and how to get quality care. Every state is required to have an Ombudsman Program that addresses complaints and advocates for improvements in the long-term care system.

Long-term Care Options Counseling: Providing information about all available community resources that will assist the client in making informed decisions.

Low-Income Subsidy (LIS): Benefits for those with limited income and resources who may qualify for extra help in paying for their prescription drug plan costs.

LTCOP: Long-term Care Ombudsman Council LTCDPP: Long-term Care Diversion Pilot Program

LTTG: Long-term Treatment Groups

M

Maintenance Care: Care given to people with chronic diseases or conditions to keep them from getting worse. For example, exercise and physical therapy can minimize abnormal or painful positioning of the joints and may prevent or delay curvature of the spine in a person with Muscular Dystrophy.

Managed Care Plan: A health plan (like an HMO) run by a private company/entity that receives a set amount of money from the government to provide Medicare-covered benefits.

Medicaid: A joint Federal and State program that helps with medical costs for some people with low incomes and limited resources. Medicaid programs vary from state to state, but most health care costs are covered if you qualify for both Medicare and Medicaid.

Medicaid Spend-Down: A state-run Medicaid program for people whose income is higher than would normally qualify them for Medicaid, but who have high medical expenses that reduce their incomes to the Medicaid eligibility level. Not all states have Medicaid spend-down.

Medical Social Services: A service generally intended to help the patient and family cope with the logistics of daily life with an advanced illness. Medical social services include assessing social and emotional factors related to the patient's illness and care; evaluating the patient's home situation, financial resources, and availability of community resources; and helping the patient access community resources to assist in recovery. The social worker may also provide counseling to the patient and family to address emotions and issues related to the illness.

Medical Supplies: Items covered by Medicare if they are used by home health agency staff to fulfill the plan of care, such as wound dressings.

Medical Underwriting: The process that an insurance company uses to decide, based on your medical history, whether or not to take your application for insurance, whether or not to add a waiting period for pre-existing conditions (if your state law allows it), and how much to charge you for that insurance.

Medically Necessary: Procedures, services, or equipment that meet good medical standards and are necessary for the diagnosis and treatment of a medical condition.

Medicare Advantage Prescription Drug Plan (MAPD): A Medicare drug plan offered through a Medicare Advantage plan (such as an HMO, PPO or PFFS) that offers Medicare prescription drug coverage (Medicare Part D). **Medicare Advantage Plan (Part C):** A type of Medicare health plan off ered by a private company that contracts with Medicare to provide you with all your Medicare Part A and Part B benefi ts. Medicare Advantage Plans include Health Maintenance Organizations. Preferred Provider Organizations, Private Feefor-Service Plans, Special Needs Plans, and Medicare Medical Savings Account Plans. If you are enrolled in a Medicare Advantage Plan, Medicare services are covered through the plan and aren't paid for under Original Medicare. Most Medicare Advantage Plans off er prescription drug coverage.

Medicare-approved Amount: In Original

Medicare, this is the amount a doctor or supplier that accepts assignment can be paid. It includes what Medicare pays and any deductible, coinsurance, or copayment that you pay. It may be less than the actual amount a doctor or supplier charges.

Medicare Carrier: A private company that has a contract with Medicare to process Part B claims. (*See also Carrier.*)

Medicare Cost Plans: A type of Medicare health plan. In a Medicare Cost Plan, if you get services outside of the plan's network without a referral, your Medicare-covered services will be paid for under Original Medicare (your Cost Plan pays for emergency services, or urgently needed services).

Medicare Prescription Drug Benefit: *See Part D.*

Medicare Savings Programs (MSP): Also known as Medicare Buy-In programs, they help pay your Medicare premiums and sometimes also coinsurance and deductibles. There are three Med-icare Savings Programs, with different eligibility limits: ΩMB, SLMB, and Ol-1.

Medicare SELECT: A type of Medigap policy that will generally give you full coverage as long as you see doctors and hospitals in its network.

Medicare Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) Plan: A type of Medicare Advant-age Plan (Part C) available in some areas of the country. In most HMOs, you can only go to doctors, specialists, or hospitals on the plan's list except in an emergency. Most HMOs also require you to get a referral from your primary care physician.

Medicare-approved Amount: In Original Medicare, this is the amount a doctor or supplier can be paid, including what Medicare pays and any deductible, coinsurance, or copayment that you pay. It may be less than the actual amount charged by a doctor or supplier

Medicare Medical Savings Account (MSA) Plan: MSA Plans combine a high deductible Medicare Advantage Plan and a bank account. The plan deposits money from

Medicare into the account. You can use the money in this account to pay for your health care costs, but only Medicare-covered expenses count toward your deductible. The amount deposited is usually less than your deductible amount so you generally will have to pay out-of-pocket before your coverage begins.

Medicare Preferred Provider Organization (PPO) Plan: A type of Medicare Advantage Plan (Part C) available in some areas of the country in which you pay less if you use doctors, hospitals, and other health care providers that belong to the plan's network. You can use doctors, hospitals, and provider outside of the network for an additional cost.

Medicare Prescription Drug Plan (Part D): A stand-alone drug plan that adds prescription drug coverage to Original Medicare, some Medicare Cost Plans, some Medicare Private-Fee-for-Service Plans, and Medicare Medical Savings Account Plans. If you have a Medigap policy without prescription drug coverage, you can also add a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan. These plans are offered by insurance companies and other private companies approved by Medicare. Medicare Advantage Plans may also offer prescription drug coverage that follows the same rules as Medicare Prescription Drug Plans

Medicare Private Fee-for-Service (PFFS) Plan: A type of Medicare Advantage Plan (Part C) in which you can generally go to any doctor or hospital you could go to if you had Original Medicare, if the doctor or hospital agrees to treat you. The plan determines how much it will pay doctors and hospitals, and how much you must pay when you receive care. A Private Fee-for-Service Plan is very different than Original Medicare, and you must follow the plan rules carefully when you go for health care services. When you're in a Private Fee-for-Service Plan, you may pay more, or less, for Medicare-covered benefit to than in Original Medicare.

Medicare Special Needs Plan (SNP): A

special type of Medicare Advantage Plan (Part C) that provides more focused and specialized health care for specific groups of people, such as those who have both Medicare and Medicaid, who reside in a nursing home, or have certain chronic medical conditions.

Medicare SELECT: A type of Medigap policy that may require you to use hospitals and, in some cases, doctors within its network to be eligible for full benefits.

Medicare Summary Notice (MSN): The notice you get in the mail from Medicare after getting medical services from a doctor, hospital or other health care provider. It tells you what the provider billed Medicare, Medicare's approved amount, the amount Medicare paid, and what you have to pay. The MSN is not a bill. (See also Explanation of Medicare Benefits (EOMB).)

Medigap: A Medicare supplemental insurance policy that is sold by private insurance companies to fill "gaps" in Original Medicare. This insurance policy is usually available in the form of ten different plans labeled A through J and only works with Original Medicare

Medgap Open Enrollment Period: A onetime-only six month period when you can buy any Medigap policy you want that is sold in your state. It starts in the first month that you are covered under Medicare Part B and you are age 65 or older. During this period, you can't be denied coverage or charged more due to past or present health problems.

Medigap Policy: Medicare supplement insurance sold by private insurance companies to fill "gaps" in Original Medicare coverage. Except in Massachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin, there are 12 standardized plans labeled Plan A through Plan L. Medigap policies only work with Original Medicare.

Memorandum of Understanding:Cooperative agreement to coordinate ADRC activities with other State agencies.

Multiple Entry Points: Various places throughout the community where a person can gain access to information and referral for

services

N

N4A: National Association of Area Agencies on Aging

NASW: National Association of Social Workers

National Coverage Determination (NCD):

A decision about particular treatments that Medicare will or will not cover for particular conditions. Medicare contractors are required to follow NCDs.

NCOA: National Council on Aging

Neglect: When care takers do not give a person they care for the goods or services needed to avoid harm or illness.

Network: A group of doctors and hospitals that contract with a managed care plan to provide healthcare services to plan members. Generally, managed care plan members may only receive covered services from doctors and hospitals in the plan's network.

Non-formulary Drugs: Drugs not on a planapproved drug list.

Nurse Practitioner: A nurse who has two or more years of advanced training and has passed a special exam. A nurse practitioner often works with a doctor and can do some of the same things a doctor does.

Nursing Facility: A facility which primarily provides skilled nursing care and related services for the rehabilitation of injured, disabled, or sick persons, or on a regular basis, health related care services above the level of custodial care to other than mentally retarded individuals.

Nurse Registry: A nurse registry acts as employment agency between an individual patient and nurses, nursing assistants, home health aides, companions and homemakers for services in the patient's home. Nurse registries also provide temporary staff for nursing homes, hospitals, and other businesses. Each individual health care worker is an independent contractor and is not a direct employee of the nurse registry. Nurse registries are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida. **Nursing Home:** A skilled nursing facility is another name for a nursing home. They pro-

vide nursing, personal, custodial, and rehabilitative care. Skilled nursing facilities are freestanding, which means they are not part of a hospital. Skilled nursing facilities are licensed and surveyed by the State of Florida.

Nutrition: Getting enough of the right foods with vitamins and minerals a body needs to stay healthy. Malnutrition, or the lack of proper nutrition, can be a serious problem for older people.

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Occupational Therapy: Therapy that helps patients to resume normal fine-motor activities.

Occupational Therapist: A rehabilitation professional who teaches people to compensate for functional limitations as a result of an injury, illness or disability by learning skills and techniques needed to perform activities of daily living and optimize independence.

Older American's Act (OAA): The sole piece of legislation that is directed to improving the lives America's elderly., particularly in relation to income, health, housing, employment, long-term care, retirement, and community services.

Ombudsman: An advocate (supporter) who works to solve problems between residents and nursing homes, as well as assisted living facilities. Also called "Long-term Care Ombudsman."

Ombudsman Programs: See Long-term Care Ombudsman Programs.

Open Enrollment Period (Medigap): A

one-time-only, 6-month period when Federal law allows you to buy any Medigap policy you want that is sold in your state. It starts in the fi rst month that you are covered under Medicare Part B and you are 65 or older. During this period, you can't be denied a Medigap policy or charged more due to past or present health problems. Some states may have additional open enrollment rights under state law

OPPAGA: Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability

Opt Out: Doctors can "opt out" of Medicare by notifying the Medicare carrier that they

will not accept Medicare payments and telling their patients—in writing before treating them—that Medicare will not pay for their services and that the patients must pay for the care themselves. Doctors who have "opted out" can charge as much as they want, and their patients have to pay the entire bill themselves. The only time a doctor who has opted out can receive payment from Medicare is when the doctor provides a patient emergency or urgent care services and the patient does not have a contract with that doctor. If the doctor did not provide a written contract before the patient received the services, the patient is not liable for payment.

Organ and Tissue Procurement: Organ and tissue procurement facilities are generally freestanding facilities that have referral relationships with transplant hospitals and surgeons. There are three types of facilities: Organ procurement organizations recover organs, hearts, lungs, kidneys, etc. from donors for transplantation; eye banks recover eyes and eye tissue for transplantation; and tissue banks recover tissue, bone, skin, tendons etc. for transplantation. Organ and tissue procurement facilities are licensed by the State of Florida.

Original Medicare: Also known as "Traditional Medicare." The Federal health insurance program, created in 1965, under which the government pays providers directly for each service a person receives (on a feefor-service basis) for your Part A and/or Part B benefits.

OSS: Optional State Supplementation

Outpatient Prospective Payment System (OPPS): The system through which Medicare decides how much money a hospital or community mental health center will get for each outpatient service patients with Medicare receive. The rate of reimbursement varies with the location of the hospital or clinic.

Out-of-Network Provider: A doctor or hospital that is not part of a managed care plan's network. If you get services from an out-of-network provider, it usually means that you likely will have to pay out of your own pocket

for the services you received.

Out-of-Pocket Costs: Health care costs that you must pay because Medicare or other insurance does not cover them.

Outpatient Care: Medical care that does not require you to stay in the hospital overnight.

Ρ

Palliative Care: The care of patients with a terminal illness, not with the intent of trying to cure them, but to relieve their symptoms. Palliative care consists of relief of pain and nausea, as well as psychological, social and spiritual support services.

Part A: The part of Medicare that covers most medically necessary hospital, skilled nursing facility, home health, and hospice care.

Part B: The part of Medicare that covers most medically necessary doctors' services, preventive care, durable medical equipment, hospital outpatient services, laboratory tests, x-rays, mental health, and some home health and ambulance services.

Part C: The part of Medicare concerning private health care plans that can offer Medicare benefits. These plans, which are sometimes known as Medicare Advantage plans, include Health Maintenance Organizations (HMOs), Preferred Provider Organizations (PPOs), Private Fee for Service plans (PFFSs) and Medical Savings Accounts (MSAs). You must have Medicare Parts A and B to join a Part C plan.

Part D: The part of Medicare that will provide prescription drug coverage starting in January 2006. The benefit will be provided by private companies. People who enroll in Part D will pay a monthly premium in addition to their Part B premium.

Participating Provider: A doctor or other health care provider who agrees to "take assignment"— accept Medicare's ap-proved amount as payment in full. Any doctor who is a "participating provider" in the Medicare program always takes assignment. Participating providers may not charge you more than Medicare's approved amount. If you have Original Medicare, you can save

money if you see a doctor who takes assignment (you still pay your coinsurance). (See also Take Assignment.)

PCP (Primary Care Physician): The doctor that manages your care and refers you to specialty care if you need it. A managed care plan, like an HMO, requires you to have a PCP. If you don't consult your PCP before seeing a specialist, your managed care plan, will likely not cover your care.

PDAA: Aging and Adult Services Program Office

Personal Care: Assistance with activities of daily living, such as bathing, feeding and toileting. Providers of personal care (home health aides) are not required to undergo medical training.

Personal Emergency Response System: In case of a fall or other medical emergency, this electronic device enables the user to contact help 24-hours-a-day simply by pressing a button. A number of private companies offer these systems.

PFFS (Private Fee-for-Service): A plan that allows you to use any doctor or hospital anywhere in the country as long as that provider accepts the plan's terms and conditions. This plan must cover all Medicare benefits and may offer additional benefits. But, you may pay more for Medicare benefits and you cannot buy a Medigap plan to fill gaps in coverage.

Physical Therapy: Exercise and physical activities used to condition muscles and improve levels of activity. Physical therapy is helpful for those with physical debilitating illness.

Physician Assistant (PA): A person who has 2 or more years of advanced training and has passed a special exam. A physician assistant works with a doctor and can do some of the things a doctor does.

PIC: Private Industry Council

Plan of Care: A doctor's written plan describing the type and frequency of services and care a particular patient needs.

POS Option (Point-of-Service Option):The right of managed care plan members to

partial coverage for certain services they get outside the managed care plan network of providers.

Power of Attorney: A written legal document in which one person (the principal) appoints another person to manage the principal's financial affairs. Even though the intent is that the power of attorney will not take effect until the principle becomes unable to handle his or her own affairs, it actually takes effect on the date it is signed, unless otherwise specified. And, unless otherwise specified, the financial durable power of attorney applies only to assets owned directly by the principal, and not to any assets transferred into a trust by the principal.

Power of Attorney for Health Care: A written legal document in which one person (the principal) appoints another person to make health care decisions on behalf of the principal in the event the principal becomes incapacitated (the document defines incapacitation). This instrument can contain instructions about specific medical treatment that should be applied or withheld. While its purpose remains essentially the same from state-to-state, the name of this document can vary; for example, in Florida it is called an Appointment of Health Care Surrogate.

PPO (Preferred Provider Organization): A type of managed care plan that should partially cover the care from out-of-network providers. To get full coverage, you must use network providers.

Pre-Authorization: Also called "pre-approval." An approval that a managed care plan member must ask for from the plan or primary care doctor fin order to know that the plan will pay for certain medical services, such as an inpatient hospital stay. In some plans, of you do not get pre-authorization the plan will not cover the care.

Pre-Existing Condition: A health problem you had before the date that a new insurance policy starts.

Premium: The amount that an individual who wants health care coverage must pay to an insurer, health plan or Medicare.

Premium Penalty: The amount that you must pay to Medicare in addition to the regular monthly premium for late enrollment. The Part B premium is an additional 10 percent of the premium for each year you delay enrollment. Part D will have a premium penalty of at least one percent for every month you delay enrollment.

Prescription Drug Plan (PDP): A "standalone" Medicare drug plan offered through a private insurance company that only offers prescription drug benefits for people with Medicare.

Preventive Care: Care to keep you healthy or prevent illness, such as routine checkups and flu shots and tests like prostate cancer screening and yearly mammograms.

Primary Care: A basic level of care usually given by doctors who work with general and family medicine, internal medicine (internists), pregnant women (obstetricians), and children (pediatricians). A nurse practitioner (NP), a State licensed registered nurse with special training, can also provide this basic level of health care.

Primary Care Physician: A doctor trained to give you basic care. Your primary care doctor is the one you see first for most health problems. He or she makes sure you get the care you need to stay healthy. He or she also may talk with other more specialized doctors and healthcare providers and refer you to them. In many Medicare managed care plans, you must see your primary care doctor before you see other healthcare providers.

Primary Caregiver: The person, usually the spouse or adult child, who takes on the primary day-to-day responsibility of caring for the physical, psychological and social needs of another person.

Primary Insurance: Health care coverage that pays first on a claim for medical and hospital care. In most cases, Medicare is your primary insurer.

Priority Services: Services designated by the Older Americans Act "to better better meet the most crucial needs of the elderly."

Private Contract: A contract between you

and a doctor, podiatrist, dentist, or optometrist who has decided not to offer services through the Medicare program. This doctor can't bill Medicare for any service or supplies given to you and all his/her other Medicare patients for at least 2 years. There are no limits on what you can be charged for services under a private contract. You must pay the full amount of the bill.

Private Fee-for-service Plan: A type of Medicare Advantage Plan in which you may go to any Medicare-approved doctor or hospital that accepts the plan's payment. The insurance plan, rather than the Medicare Program, decides how much it will pay and what you pay for the services you get. You may pay more or less for Medicare-covered benefits. You may have extra benefits Original Medicare doesn't cover.

Privately Funded Services: Those services which are paid for using funds that are not from public sources.

Programs of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE): PACE combines medical, social, and long-term care services for frail people to help people stay independent and living in their community as long as possible, while getting the high-quality care they need. PACE is available only in states that have chosen to offer it under Medicaid. To be eligible, you must

1) be 55 years old or older, 2) live in the service area of the PACE program, 3) be certified as eligible for nursing home care by the appropriate state agency, and 4) be able to live safely in the community.

Provider: An individual or facility (such as a doctor, hospital or durable medical equipment supplier), which provides health care services. (See also Health Care Provider and Supplier.)

PSA: Planning and Service Area

PSO: (Provider-sponsored Organization) A type of managed care plan that is very similar to an HMO, except that it is operated by a group of doctors and hospitals. This plan is not available in most parts of the country.

Publicly Funded Programs: Those programs using federal or state funds to provide

services

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QI-1 (Qualifying Individual-1 Program): Federal program administered by each state's Medicaid program that pays the Part B premium for people with Medicare with low incomes.

QI-2 (Qualifying Individual-2 Program): Until 2001, this federal program administered by each state's Medicaid program paid the Part B premium for people with Medicare with low incomes. This program is no longer offered.

Quality **Improvement Organizations** (QIOs): Groups of practicing doctors and other health care experts. They are paid by the federal government to check and improve the care given to Medicare patients. They must review your complaints about the quality of care given by: inpatient hospitals, hospital outpatient departments, hospital emergency rooms, skilled nursing facilities, home health agencies, Private Fee-for-Service Plans, and ambulatory surgical centers. These doctors also review fast-track termination decisions in comprehensive outpatient rehabilitation facilities, skilled nursing facilities, and home health and hospice settings for people in Medicare Health Plans.

QMB (Qualified Medicare Beneficiary Program): Federal program administered by each state's Medicaid program that helps people with Medicare with low incomes pay their coinsurance, deduct-ibles, and premiums.

R

Railroad Medicare Carrier: A private company that provides Medicare coverage for railroad retirement beneficiaries.

Referral: Authorization that an HMO and other managed care plans usually require for services not provided your primary care doctor. For instance, HMOs generally require you to get a referral from your primary care doctor in order to see a specialist or get an eye exam.

Referral Agreement: Cooperative agreement to coordinate I & R services

Referral and Assistance: Information gathered about the clients needs, and contacts made with the resource for the client as described in the January 2000 Home and Community Based Services Manual.

Regional Home Health Intermediary: A private company that contracts with Medicare to pay home health bills and monitor the quality of home health care. There are four Regional Home Health Intermediaries in the U.S., each serving states in one of four U.S. regions.

Rehabilitation Agencies: A rehabilitation agency provides a multidisciplinary program to help improve the physical function of disabled individuals by creating a team of specialized rehabilitation staff. The rehabilitation agency provides at least physical therapy or speech-language pathology services and social or vocational adjustment services. Rehabilitation agencies are not required to be licensed by the state if they are Medicare certified. Rehab agencies that are not certified under the Medicare program may require licensure as a health care clinic. Extension Unit is a location other than the rehabilitation agency's main location where services are provided (this cannot include a patient's

Rehabilitative Care: The care of patients with the intent of curing, improving or preventing a worsening of their condition. For example, physical therapy after hip replacement surgery to resume walking, or occupational therapy to prevent carpal tunnel syndrome.

Residential Care Facility: A generic term for a group home, specialized apartment complex or other institution that provides care services where individuals live. The term is used to refer to a range of residential care options including assisted living facilities, board and care homes and skilled nursing facilities.

Respite Care: A hospice service that provides relief for caregivers of hospice patients by arranging a brief period (up to five days) of inpatient care for the patient.

Retiree Insurance: Health insurance provided by employers to former employees who have retired. Retiree insurance always pays secondary to (after) Medicare.

Retroactive Disenrollment: A way to discontinue enrollment in a Medicare private plan that you mistakenly joined, effective back to the date you joined, and enroll in Original Medicare as of that date. Your providers will need to resubmit any claims from the time you joined the Medicare private plan to Original Medicare.

RFP: Request for Proposal

RSVP: Retired Senior Volunteer Program

S

Screening: Completing the 701A or the alternate DOEA screening tool

Second Opinion: This is when another doctor gives his or her view about what you have and how it should be treated.

Secondary Insurance: Health care coverage that pays after the primary insurer on a claim for medical or hospital care. It usually pays for all or some of the costs that the primary insurer did not cover, but may not cover services not covered by the primary insurer. (See also Supplemental Insurance.)

Service Area: The area within which a private Medicare plan provides medical services to its members. In an HMO, it is the area where your network of doctors and hospitals is located.

SHINE (Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders): A federally-funded program in each state that answers questions about Medicare free of charge.

Skilled Care: Medically reasonable and necessary care performed by a skilled nurse or therapist. If a home health aide (someone who provides help with daily living activities, such as bathing and eating) or other person can perform the service, it is not considered "skilled care." Skilled nursing includes care from Registered Nurses (RNs) and Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs). Skilled therapy includes care from licensed physical, occupational and speech therapists.

Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF): A

Medicare-approved facility which provides short-term post-hospital extended care services, at a lower level of care than provided in a hospital.

Skilled Nursing Services: Services from a registered nurse, which include administration of medications; tube feedings; catheter changes; wound care; teaching and training activities; observation and assessment of a patient's condition; and management and evaluation of a patient's care plan.

Skilled Therapy Services: Services from licensed physical, speech/language, and occupational therapists (if originally accompanied by physical or speech therapy services). Physical therapy services which qualify people for home health care include: assessment; therapeutic exercises; gait training; range of motion tests; ultrasound, shortwave, and micro-wave diathermy treatments; teaching services; and development, implementation, management, and evaluation of a patient care plan. Maintenance therapy is covered if a physical therapist's skills are necessary for the safe and effective provision of repetitive services which use complex, sophisticated procedures.

SLMB (Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary Program): Federal program administered by each state's Medicaid program that pays the Part B premium for people with Medicare with low incomes.

Social Health Maintenance Organization (SHMO): A special type of health plan that provides the full range of Medicare benefits offered by standard Medicare HMOs, plus other services that include the following: prescription drug and chronic care benefits, respite care, and short-term nursing home care; homemaker, personal care services, and medical transportation; eyeglasses, hearing aids, and dental benefits.

Special Election Period: A set time when you can switch to another Medicare private health plan, if one is available. During this time, Medicare private plans must enroll individuals who apply whose private plans are closing.

Special Enrollment Period (SEP): A period of time, triggered by specific circumstances, during which you can enroll in Medicare Part B or Part D without having to pay a premium penalty. Under Part B, your SEP begins the month after employment or group health coverage ends (whichever comes first). Under Part D, you are eligible for an SEP if you lose — through no fault of your own — any type of drug coverage that was considered "creditable."

Specialist: A doctor who specializes in treating only a certain part of the body or condition. For instance, a cardiologist only treats people with heart problems.

Speech Therapy: Therapeutic treatment of speech impairments (such as lisping and stuttering) or speech difficulties that result from illness.

SRA: Senior Resource Alliance

SSDI (Social Security Disability Insurance): Monthly benefits provided through the United States Social Security Administration for people who lose their ability to work because of a medical impairment. People who receive SSDI for 24 months are eligible for Medicare.

SSI (Supplementary Security Income): Monthly benefits for people with low incomes and assets who are older than 65, blind, or have a disability.

State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP): Federally funded program to provide counseling to seniors regarding their insurance needs. In Florida that program is called SHINE (Serving Health Insurance Needs of Elders).

State Insurance Department: A state agency that regulates insurance and can provide information about Medigap policies and other private insurance.

State Pharmaceutical Assistance Program (SPAP): State-subsidized programs that provide assistance in paying for prescription drug costs. SPAPs vary by state.

STCM: Short-Term Case Management **Sub-Acute Care**: Typically following a stay in a hospital, this is maintenance care for seri-

ous medical conditions that are not urgent or life-threatening. Hospitals typically do not provide sub-acute care on an ongoing basis. Sub-acute care may include long-term ventilator care or other procedures provided on a routine basis either at home or by trained staff at a skilled nursing facility.

Supplemental Insurance: Supplemental insurance fills gaps in Medicare coverage by helping to pay for the portion of health care expenses that Original Medicare does not pay for, such as deductibles and coinsurance. Supplemental insurance includes Medigap plans and retiree insurance from a former employer. Supplemental insurance may offer additional benefits that Medicare does not cover.

Supplier: A person or business from whom you can buy medical equipment, like a walker or wheelchair. (*See also Provider and Durable Medical Equipment (DME)*.)

Support Group: A group of people with a common experience, such a disease, disorder, caregiving, etc., where one can share one's thoughts, feelings and concerns and receive information and support from other members of the group. Groups may or may not be facilitated by an expert.

Survivor: In the case of a husband and wife, the surviving spouse.

Т

Take Assignment: A term used to describe an agreement by a doctor to accept Medicare's approved amount as payment in full. Any doctor who is a "participating provider" in the Medicare program always takes assignment. Participating providers may not charge you more than Medicare's approved amount. If you have Original Medicare, it can save you money to see a doctor who takes assignment. But, you still pay your coinsurance (or share) of the cost of the doctor visit, usually 20 percent of the Medicare-approved amount. (See also Participating Provider.)

Telemedicine: Professional services given to a patient through an interactive telecommunications system by a practitioner at a dis-

tant site.

Tiers: To have lower costs, many plans place drugs in different "tiers," which cost different amounts. Each plan can form tiers in different ways. Here is an example of how a plan might form tiers.

For example: Tier 1 - Generic drugs (Tier 1 drugs will cost you the least amount.) Tier 2 - Preferred brand-name drugs. (Tier 2 drugs will cost you more than Tier 1 drugs.) Tier 3 - Non-preferred brand-name drugs. (Tier 3 drugs will cost you more than Tier 1 and Tier 2 drugs.)

Treatment: Something done to help with a health problem. For example, medicine and surgery are treatments.

Transitional Living Facility: A transitional living facility provides services to persons with a spinal-cord-injury or head-injury. Specialized health care services include rehabilitative services, community reentry training, aids for independent living, counseling, and other services. This term does not include a hospital licensed under chapter 395 or any federally operated hospital or facility. A transitional living facility is licensed by the State of Florida.

Triage: Screening, eligibility, options counseling, and referral process

TRICARE: The Department of Defense's health care program for active duty and retired military personnel and their family members. TRICARE consists of several different programs, including TRICARE for Life, a retiree benefit that acts as supplemental coverage to Medicare. TRICARE also offers coverage to reserve force members who are on active duty for 30 days or more.

TRICARE for Life: The health care program for military retirees who have served honorably for at least 20 years. They must be enrolled in Part B to receive the benefits. It pays secondary to Medicare and covers out-of-pocket expenses including deductibles and coinsurance. People who qualify can receive free or low-cost medications from military treatment facilities, TRICARE network and non-network pharmacies, and the National Mail Order Pharmacy.

TTY: A teletypewriter (TTY) is a communication device used by people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or have a severe-speech impairment. A TTY consists of a keyboard, display screen, and modem. Messages travel over regular telephone lines. People who don't have a TTY can communicate with a TTY user through a message relay center (MRC). An MRC has TTY operators available to send and interpret TTY messages.

TTY/TDD: Telecommunication Devices for the Deaf

U

Unearned income: Money you get from sources other than current employment. Includes Social Security benefits, Vet-erans benefits, pensions, annuities and other regular payments you receive, such as alimony and workers' compensation.

Urgent Care: A sudden illness or injury that needs immediate medical attention but is not life threatening.

Validation: The process by which the integrity and correctness of data are established. Validation processes can occur immediately after a data item is collected or after a complete set of data is collected.

Veterans Administration (VA) Benefits: Benefits given by the federal government to people who have been in "active" service in the military, naval, or air service (veterans, not career officials) and, under certain conditions, to their family members. These benefits include pensions, educational stipends and health care, among others. Veterans can receive VA health care services only at VA facilities. (*See also Department of Veteran's Affairs.*)

Waiting Period: The time between when you sign up for a Medigap or private Medicare health plan and the coverage begins.
